This year we have a Public Policy Committee, composed of Dierdre Danahar, Joan Larsen, and me. We will try to keep you informed of issue importance to AAUW members through the *Initiative* and through announcements at branch meetings.

One of our ongoing issues is **education**, with emphasis on equity in education for women and girls and over the life span.

Some of the ways of accomplishing equity and putting into action our biennial theme, "Education as the Gateway to Women's Economic Security," include the following, taken from the Association and the AAUW Illinois public policy positions.

- Equity for women and girls in all phases of public education through bias-free opportunities.
- Increasing the number of girls enrolled in math and science courses and to encourage girls to consider careers in math and science.
- Working with school districts to eliminate sexual harassment in the schools.
- Forward funding of public education at all levels.
- Working for full and equitable funding of all mandated programs.
- Vigorous enforcement of Title IX.

Since the Gubernatorial campaign begins in earnest this month, you can check out the positions of both candidates and see how each one is rated by A+ Illinois, of which AAUW is a member. Go to aplusillinois.org and check out the ratings. While you're there, sign the petition for full and fair funding of Illinois schools linked with property tax relief. AAUW Illinois has been working on this issue as long as I can remember!

In future issues of the *Initiative*, look for discussions related to health and other topics related to "positive societal change."

AAUW Regional Conference

On June 9 – 11, Shirley Dadonna and I met with our AAUW sisters from five states, Illinois, Wisconsin, Indiana, Michigan, and Ohio, at the Regional Conference in Lisle/Naperville. I was reminded, once again, of what a powerful voice this

organization is for women and girls as we listened, participated, and conversed throughout the three days of conference sessions.

The new program theme, "Education as the Gateway to Women's Economic Security," was given emphasis and has inspired the program planning for our branch this year. In a session called "The Power of the Purse" we learned that 95% of women are responsible for money management at some point in their lives. Jennifer Wilken of IL gave a dynamic, "hands on" presentation, distributing calculators and worksheets to each of us as we learned what we need to know about the ongoing process of financial planning.

Another impressive session was led by Georgia Duerst-Lahti, a professor at Beloit College, whose topic was "Power: Women Leading Political Change." She emphasized that government will only work for women when policy reflects what women want. She described the leadership needed for policy change and the basic principles of leadership that women should follow for success in effecting change. Georgia is a featured commentator on Wisconsin public radio and writes extensively on gender and politics.

The most moving of the presentations was the story told by Dr. Charlene McMahon, a professor of chemistry who was denied tenure by Carroll College in WI. Although a faculty committee of five unanimously voted in favor, based on merit, the president and the board denied her tenure. She started the biochemistry program at the college, taught in more areas than other chemistry faculty, and had larger classes. She said "I thought the world was a fair place until this happened." She has accumulated a total of \$300,000 in legal fees.

The AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund, which now supports her case, has contributed \$21,500. Charlene has put in \$17,500 of her own money and her friends have donated \$10,000. She reminded us that only 27% of tenured professors are female and that there's a big gender gap in math, biology, chemistry, and physics where women are obviously undervalued. Asked if she was a member of AAUW, she said, "I am so grateful. I will be a member of this organization until the day I die."

Our eyes filled with tears as we got out our checkbooks to make extra donations, totaling \$4,342 to LAF. It was a very proud moment, knowing that our organization's Legal Advocacy

Fund is the largest legal fund which supports plaintiffs in sexual discrimination cases in higher education. (And when we in the branch buy Rada knives and Gwen Frostic stationery, we can be proud that we are contributing to a most important and deserving cause.)

The regional conference certainly provided another opportunity for me to expand my knowledge and appreciation of AAUW.

First Annual AAUW-IL 2006 Loyalty Awards

Personalize Your Messages to Congress

In a recent survey by the Congressional Management Foundation (CMF) it was found that over half of Congressional staffers polled said they believe the form-emails they receive from constituents are sent without the constituents' knowledge. The CMF report concludes that:

"Quality is more persuasive than quantity. Thoughtful, personalized constituent messages generally have more influence than a large number of identical form messages. Grassroots campaigns should consider placing greater emphasis on generating messages of higher quality and reducing form communications..." (Communicating With Congress: How Capitol Hill Is Coping With the Surge in Citizen Advocacy http://www.cmfweb.org).

Additionally, many congressional offices have small staffs that struggle to manage thousands of emails received by the office each day. Staff must quickly skim emails and faxes to determine whether the communications are spam or are related to real federal issues. Staff skim emails and faxes looking for personalized communications, which get pulled for greater consideration. Meanwhile, form emails and faxes are more likely to be mistaken as spam or set aside with other form letters.

Candidates Don't Make the Grade

A+ Illinois

A+ Illinois has released a side-by-side "report card" analysis of the education funding plans proposed by Democratic gubernatorial candidate Rod Blagojevich and Republican candidate Judy Baar Topinka, grading the strength of each candidate's proposal in five key areas:

- Fair and adequate school funding that meets the recommendations of the state Education Funding Advisory Board.
- Sustainable school funding source that provides reliable, stable long-term resources for schools.
- Meaningful property-tax relief.
- Strategies to close the student achievement gap.
- A plan to improve the state's ailing fiscal health and protect funding for essential programs such as health care and human services.

A+ Illinois is disappointed that both leading-party candidates have ideas to improve school quality, but neither has proposed a comprehensive, sustainable school funding plan that ends our overreliance on local property taxes. All candidates — for governor and legislative office — should listen to Illinois voters, who are worried that our schools don't have the resources they need to prepare kids for the jobs of the 21st century.

A+ Illinois is currently analyzing the education proposals of Green Party gubernatorial candidate Rich Whitney, who was recently authorized to appear on the November ballot.

New Poll Finds Education Is Top Election Issue in Illinois

A recent poll by Harstad Strategic Research found that Illinois voters rank public education as the top issue they want to see state leaders address during this election year — higher than jobs, gas prices, or health care. Nearly two-thirds of voters want to see an increase in the state's share of funding for public education.

The study found that support for increased funding is broad-based, including in Chicago, suburban, and downstate communities. The survey even found extensive support from those without children in public schools.
