# Public Policy Jan De Young

First, a big "thank you" to the women who participated in the signings of the Equal Pay Proclamation in Equal Pay Day. In Macomb, our representatives were Betty Kaspar, Rose McConnell, and Marilyn Van Ausdall with Mayor Michael Inman. In Monmouth, our contingent consisted of members Lila Blum, Stacy Cordery, Brigit Draxler, Jan DeYoung, and Alice Lawson. Emily Rollie, and Amy Zesbaugh and four Monmouth College students, Lily Anderson, Jessica Bybee, Leslie Legg, and Kaitlyn Pfau, with Mayor Rod Davies. I hope you saw the pictures in the papers or on our website. In case you missed the picture, a copy is above. It's too bad that the cutline in the Review-Atlas omitted a reference to AAUW!

Unfortunately, at the national level, we didn't fare very well. Although President Obama signed an Executive Order on Pay Equity Day banning retaliation against federal employees who discuss salary with colleagues or inquire about salary policies with their employers, the big push to pass the Paycheck Fairness Act did not get to the Senate floor because of a Republican filibuster.

(FYI: Senator Durbin voted to bring the bill to the Senate floor; Senator Kirk did not vote.)

The Executive order, affecting employees of federal contractors, may help 22% of the nation's workforce. While that is good news, the fact that the main thrust for pay equity was defeated before it had a chance for debate is very discouraging.

Here are a few more facts related to this issue: the best place for a woman to work in the U.S. is Washington, D.C., where women earn about 90% of men's earnings. The worst is Wyoming, where a woman makes only 64% of a man's wages. Race matters, too. An Asian-American woman earns 87% of a man's salary, while a Hispanic woman makes just 53%! And there's also an age factor: the average for all women up to the age of 35 is 90%, while women between 35 and 54 come in between 75% and 80%.

If you haven't already taken action, or even if you have—multiple times—please go to AAUW.org and click on the Two-Minute Activist button. Register your opinion—again! We're not giving up!
