President's Report

I've done something that I hope will bring our organization more visibility in the area, but more than that I'm excited that we'll be able to offer the \$tart \$mart program to area college women soon to be entering the job market. I received training last month to be a workshop facilitator. My next step will be to establish contacts at Monmouth, Knox, and WIU and interest them in the program. They will then work together with AAUW and the WAGE Project (soon to be solely under the AAUW umbrella) to customize materials for each specific campus audience.

The \$tart \$mart campus initiative was developed by WAGE to empower college women with the tools to negotiate salaries and benefits. The workshops are nuts-and-bolts trainings designed to help young women obtain fair and realistic salaries. Participants will learn about the consequences of the gender wage gap for young women, along with budgeting and compensation benchmarking for a sample career and location. Each workshop takes about three hours, including time for questions and role-playing.

There is a fee involved for colleges to offer the workshop, since each one is designed specifically for that particular college. There are also printing costs for the college. Additionally, the college is responsible for the travel-related expenses of the facilitator. My goal in being trained was to save area colleges the facilitator expense, since I'm close enough that they won't have to house, feed, or pay for my transportation. I'm also hoping that branch members will be willing to provide drinks and snacks for workshop attendees, which will

save participating colleges the food expense for workshop attendees.

A typical workshop will have at most 40 participants. The majority of workshop facilitators are AAUW member **volunteers**. Any interested members of our branch who observe a workshop will be eligible to receive a 2-hour phone training (as I did) to become a facilitator. The program is very well planned out with a Power Point presentation and facilitator's guide. If we get some workshops lined up, I'll be encouraging other members to consider becoming facilitators. It's something we can actually do to help close that gender wage gap.

AAUW November 10 Program Human Trafficking

Tom Colclasure will be the speaker for our November meeting. Tom is CEO/President of Asha for Life Community in Galesburg. He has worked in the social services field for the past twenty years, assisting persons with chronic mental illness as they strive for recovery and reintegration into their communities. Tom holds a Master's degree in History from Western Illinois University. He is married to Heather Hellenga, who teaches 5th grade at Steele School in Galesburg, and they have two children, Harper Lee, 16, and Jackson, 12.

The mission of Asha for Life Community is to provide relief to victims of human trafficking and modern slavery. Asha works independently and also partners with other organizations to fulfill this mission, by educating people about the consequences of human trafficking and the sex slave trade. Additionally, holistic health care, education, housing, and employment training and opportunities are provided to victims.

The issue of human trafficking is one that perhaps we don't think about as being in our communities.

Obviously, Asha for Life Community would not have been started by concerned citizens in Galesburg if this were true.

Please put November 10 on your calendars so that we can have a good-sized audience for Tom as he travels to Monmouth to educate us about this very important issue. The Pattee Auditorium is a state-of-the-art classroom in the newest building on the Monmouth College campus. The Center for Science and Business is

conveniently located on East Broadway between 6th and 7th streets. A parking lot is available right in front of the building, and members can take the stairs or an elevator down a floor from the main entrance to get to the Pattee Auditorium.

Branch History, Part 2 Jan De Young

In the early days, not all colleges were recognized by AAUW. In 1924 at the annual meeting of the Association of College Deans, Miss Gibson and Miss Barr met with the Recognition Committee of AAUW regarding admission of Monmouth College to the list of colleges approved by AAUW, whose graduates were therefore eligible for AAUW membership. At the time, Monmouth College failed to meet the standards established for physical education in organized sports and for having too few PhD's on the faculty. In 1926 at the AAUW state convention, Miss Hanna spoke with the national executive secretary about admitting Monmouth College to the roster of approved colleges. Standards for admission were tightening, and a plan was set into motion to review all colleges on the AAUW approved list to make sure that they still met the standards.

A member of the AAUW Visitation Committee, Miss Mary Ross Potter, came to Monmouth in February of 1927 to inspect the college for membership, and it was announced at the National Convention that year that AAUW had been approved for admission.

In 1927 the branch began to offer a \$70 scholarship to a Monmouth College woman. Funds were raised for the first scholarship by assessing each member \$5.00 and taking \$10.00 from the treasury. In 1927 the branch raised \$225 for the permanent scholarship fund by producing a play, "Mr. Pim Passes By," by A.A. Milne. Dr. Toussaint of Monmouth College Speech Department directed the production, and Miss Ruth Williams, also of the Speech Department, appeared in a starring role, along with others from the college faculty, the high school faculty, AAUW members, and other members of the community.

In January, 1927, Dean Cleland of the College spoke about the "Roles of University Women in the World." He said that "practically all fields of work are open to women but women should choose those parts for which they are especially fitted by nature to fill."

In October of 1929 the branch voted to admit Associate members, women who had attended but had not graduated from college, and those who had graduated from institutions which had not yet been accredited by AAUW.

In 1930 the famous Cornelia Otis Skinner gave a program, sponsored by AAUW, for which main floor seats cost \$1.00 and balcony seats \$.75. After paying Ms. Skinner her guaranteed \$300 and other expenses, the branch made a profit of \$105.21.

During these years the branch continued to meet in members' homes, including Mrs. Quinby's house, the Association Room at the college library, Sunnyside, and the Terrace, and had dinner meetings at the Colonial Hotel and Hawcock's Café.

Membership grew from 16 in 1925-26 to 42 in 1927. There was a big increase in membership after Monmouth College was accredited by AAUW and after a tea for Monmouth College women graduates who lived in the community.



Public Policy

Marilyn Van Ausdall, Alice Lawson, and Jan DeYoung registered 38 new voters at Monmouth College over the lunch and dinner hours on September 29th. In addition, we enabled 15 or 20 students to check online to be sure that they were registered and gave information on absentee voting over the college's Fall Break to a few more. We felt that the time was well spent. Many thanks to Marilyn and Alice!

Please urge all your family members and friends to vote in the mid-term elections, Tuesday, November 4th. The issues at stake are critical for women and young people.

The representatives whom we send to Springfield and Washington can carry our wishes and support our issues only if we vote!

To see how our Members of Congress voted on issues selected as priorities by AAUW, check out the Congressional Voting Record online at aauw.org, or pick up a hard copy at our next meeting. Among the topics included in the Voting Record are the Paycheck Fairness Act (S. 84 and H.R.377); Minimum Wage Fairness Act (S. 2223); the Employment Non-Discrimination Act of 2013 (S. 815); The Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act of 2013 (S. 47); and the Protect Women's Health from Corporate Interference Act of 2014 (S. 2578).

In Illinois, it is imperative that we send a representative to Springfield who supports passage of the ERA. Since our branch members live in several different districts, we need to find out whether or not our own rep supports ERA. We hope that passage of ERA will come up for a vote in the General Assembly in the November veto session. If it does, I'll be sure to let you know so that you can make that very important telephone call to Ms. Tracy, Ms. Hammond, or Mr. Moffitt. Senator Sullivan did vote in favor of ERA, so please thank him if you haven't already done so! Illinois is one of the target states in the "Three-State Initiative" to get ERA into the U.S. Constitution. Now is a good time to check out your representative's position on ERA, so that you know how to word your phone call in November.

If you will be out of town on November 4th, or if you just prefer to vote early, please head to the second floor of the Warren County Courthouse (or Knox County or McDonough County Courthouse, if appropriate!), and cast your ballot. If, for any chance, you are not yet registered, you can go to the Courthouse and register and vote at the same time. So . . . no excuses!

In District 238, Monmouth-Roseville Community Unit District, there's a very important school tax issue on the ballot, too. There's an informational meeting in the Media Center at Monmouth-Roseville High School on the tax levy on Tuesday, October 28 at 7:00 p.m. Please try to attend this meeting in order to inform yourself on this very important proposal.
