One AAUW. One Mission. One Fund

The AAUW Fund advances our mission by supporting and sustaining all of our programs and activities. Our dues pay salaries and rent, but it is our gifts that provide for AAUW's programming and outreach.

The AAUW Fund is the monetary umbrella that funds the special components that advance our mission of equity for women and girls. It is sustained by our gifts. These funds given as individual donations or through collective fundraising efforts make possible a large variety of programs.

Our Public Policy Program works at the local, state, and national level on lobbying and grassroots efforts to empower women and girls. The Eleanor Roosevelt Fund supports the research on equity which drives our public policy decisions.

Several projects involve work on college and university campuses. Campus Outreach Grants provide funding to local branches to sponsor events on unfair pay, Title IX violations, and sexual harassment and assault. Campus Action Projects Grants provide funding for college women to design projects that will empower women to confront barriers. Elect Her is the only national program that encourages and trains college women to run for student government and future political office. The National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) is the premier annual conference that prepares attendees to be campus and community leaders.

The Legal Advocacy Fund is under the AAUW Fund umbrella. It challenges sex discrimination in higher education and the workplace by providing funding for plaintiffs. The LAF Case Support Travel Grants provide travel expenses so that our branch members can learn of LAF success at state conventions and conferences.

New programs are developed through the support of the AAUW Fund. Branch member Marilyn Van Ausdall is a \$tart \$mart facilitator and provides training for college women to learn how to negotiate their starting salary. Starting smart, women will not lag behind men for pay and pensions. Tech Trek supports weeklong camps which encourage attendees to enroll in STEM courses and consider STEM careers. Tech Savvy supports daylong conferences to interest girls in grades 6--9 in STEM fields.

The AAUW Fund also helps keep our members informed through support of the biennial national convention, the publication of *Outlook*, and member leadership training opportunities.

AAUW confronts barriers on many fronts, and the AAUW Fund financially supports these efforts.
