Women's History Month Presentation

Strategies for Success: The Illinois Equal Suffrage Association's Activism in the 1910s" by Dr. Virginia Boynton

On Thursday, March 3, we'll celebrate Women's History Month with a presentation on women's suffrage by Virginia Boynton, Professor of History at Western Illinois University. Virginia came to WIU in 1995 where she teaches courses which include American women's history and the history of Interwar America (1914-

1945). Her research examines women's involvement through the Illinois Women's Committee in the state's government-sponsored war effort during World War I, and also focuses on elite women's political culture from 1890 – 1940.

Among her several awards, Virginia has received the Outstanding Faculty Award for Service from the WIU College of Arts and Sciences, the WIU HOPE Award for Outstanding Teaching, and the Illinois State Historical Society's award for outstanding scholarly publications in Illinois history. She currently serves as Project Director for the history department's grant from the U.S. Department of Education for Teaching American History.

Virginia received her B.G.S. degree from University of Michigan and an M.A. and Ph.D. from Ohio State University.

Elevator Speech

When Ruth Sweetser was president of AAUW, she told us we should all have an elevator speech, a short prepared answer that sums up what AAUW is all about and what it means to us. I have been working on mine with the help of AAUW.org.

We take action on many gender issues, and currently our list includes civil rights, education, economic security, and Title IX. Every member can be involved in our lobbying efforts through the Two Minute Activist.

Our research is ongoing, and our latest document is on the status of women in leadership. The gender wage gap research is updated state by state every three months. (Illinois continues to rank 25th at 79 %.) We recently made headlines when we challenged a report that many campuses across the country are reporting that rape does not exist on their campus. Our research says otherwise.

Our Legal Advocacy Fund supports sexual harassment cases and our educational grants and awards have helped thousands of women and provided outstanding branch outreach programs.

We continue to be at the forefront of STEM encouragement, and we are becoming more and more visible on college and university campuses. We believe that campus leadership is linked to future leadership.

We are gaining new college and university partners around the world and have granted more than 3000 fellowships to women scholars from 134 countries.

We continue to incubate and develop programming that helps women. Our salary negotiations workshops, Start Smart and now Work Smart, are designed to help women learn to negotiate their salary and ultimately their financial security.

Now to sum all of that into a brief answer. The elevator is moving and the doors are about to open.

Here goes: "AAUW works for equity for all through research, through lobbying, through legal and financial support. AAUW believes that gaps in pay and leadership and career opportunities can be closed by education and training. We educate ourselves on issues that are vital to our full participation in society and then we work for that full participation."--Donna Sproston

Two Minute Activist

If you are not currently participating in AAUW's program that encourages us to act on our issues, please visit AAUW.org and search for Two-Minute Activist. When there is work to be done, you will receive an email reminder. It is quite simple and only takes two minutes or less. The message is usually directed to members of Congress before a vote on an issue we support or oppose. However, this past weekend, a Two-Minute Activist was directed at ABC. Based on polling data, ABC decided to leave Carly Fiorina out of Saturday night's GOP Debate. Fiorina garnered the same number of delegates in Iowa as Jeb Bush and John Kasich and more delegates than Chris Christie, and AAUW believed that eliminating only one candidate on suspect polling data was unfair in light of Fiorina's Iowa results and the unreliable of recent polls. We do not endorse candidates, but we do want a level playing field. AAUW cried foul.
