Presidents' Report

Voter Turnout in Presidential Elections

Monmouth Branch of AAUW did our bit in attempting to improve voter turnout in Warren County. Although we didn't get the numbers we had in previous years, we did manage to get about 25 people registered at Monmouth College, including one new faculty member and a 50-year-old volunteer who has never voted. Since Tina Conard, County Clerk, and her staff have been available at the college every Tuesday since September and will continue through November 1st, it is not surprising that we didn't attract a large number at the Volunteer Fair, though we did get a picture and a mention in the Review-Atlas. We snagged only three people at Jamieson Center, two of them college students, when we attended their pumpkin painting event. Still, the contact with Jamieson Center and director Nancy Mowen, could lead to a productive relationship in other ways. Mr. Melton at Monmouth-Roseville High School did not respond to my call or email, offering to come to the school and register seniors.

AAUW is working hard to improve voter turnout, which is dismal in America. In 2012, in spite of \$6 Billion spent on campaigns and eight million more eligible voters, turnout actually FELL from 62.3% in 2008 to 57.5% in 2012, lower than the 60.4% in 20014 but higher than 200's 54.2%. In 2008, there were 131 million voters who turned out; in 2012, only 126 million Americans voted. 93 million eligible voters did not vote in 2012! Turnout increased in only two states, lowa and Louisiana. Compare this with Belgium, with an 87% turnout, Turkey at 84.3, or Sweden, at 82.6%. It should be noted that voting is compulsory in both Belgium and Turkey.

It is also interesting to note who votes. According to Policy.mic, of those who earn more than \$150,000, turnout is 52%, compared with 25% of those earning

less than \$10,000. Of people between the ages of 18 and 24 earning less than \$24,000, turnout was 12 %! People over 65, earning more than \$150,000, voted at a 65% level. And yet young people who don't vote are in favor of increasing government services and spending, spending on the poor, guaranteeing jobs and a standard of living, and a reduction of inequality. Only 22% of voters over 65 support such programs.

I know all of you will vote, but maybe you want to make a phone call or send an email to someone in the Millennial age group and urge her/him to vote!

Stephanie Kincaid, Title IX Coordinator, presented "What's it all About? What Monmouth College in Doing About Discrimination and Sexual Harassment, On and Off Campus" in a program sponsored by the Monmouth Area Branch AAUW held on September 26, 2016 on the Monmouth campus.

Kincaid outlined the college's comprehensive plan to adhere to Title IX guidelines which involves establishing procedures for reporting crimes, guaranteeing victims' enhanced rights, and maintaining standards for conducting proceedings with the victim or "reporter" and the "respondent."

The Monmouth plan also includes providing community-wide prevention education programs for students, faculty, and staff. In this regard, the college seeks to create an atmosphere of respect in which friends protect friends, particularly in social situations where an individual might not exercise the best judgment. In the case of students who suffer sexual assault, the program emphasizes no victim- blaming. The campus education program, which is on-going, extends to residence halls, sororities, fraternities, athletes, coaches, faculty, and staff.

AAUW statistics reveal that one in five women students will experience rape or sexual assault while in college. Sexual assault prevention is a high priority on the Monmouth College campus. For more information about Monmouth College's sexual assault policies, visit the Monmouth College website at
