Guess what! ERA has been introduced in the Illinois General Assembly—again! While it is not clear whether the proposal to override the "expiration date" of the ERA will pass Congress, nevertheless, we will persist!

The bill's number is SJRCA0004. It was introduced by Senator Heather A. Steans. At this time there is no

word on when it might come to the floor. It was placed on the calendar of First Reading, Constitutional Amendments, on April 27th. However, you can contact Representative Randy Frese or Representative Norine Hammond and Senator Jil Tracy at any time (and preferably more than once!) before the General Assembly wraps up the session, officially the end of May. Since none of our representatives has yet signed on as a co-sponsor, it would be good to ask each of them to show their support by becoming a co-sponsor!
