Cosponsored by the Monmouth Branch of AAUW and the Department of Educational Studies at Monmouth College, the title of the panel is "Future of Public Education Panel: Local and National Initiatives to Address Rural Teacher Shortages." Panelists will include Gary Funk from the Rural Schools Collaborative

We are so excited to be collaborating with Tammy LaPrad of the Monmouth College Educational Studies Department this Fall Semester to provide four STEM workshops for girls in 4th, 5th, and 6th grade. Tammy has selected an Aerospace Engineering curriculum from the AAUW website to use as a basis for the activities. Take a look at the STEM activities on aauw.org. I think you will be impressed!

So far, seven branch members and one prospective member are signed up to participate, but we can use a few more "helping hands" in order to maximize the effectiveness of the lessons. Tammy has five college students in the class, so we are hoping for at least eight AAUW members to be involved. We don't yet know how many middle-schoolers have signed up, but it could be quite a few!

Dates are all Tuesdays: September 11, October 9, November 13, and December 11. The girls will come to us right after school, about 3:30, collect their snacks, and be ready to participate in the hands-on activities. We will be able to keep most of the students until 4:45, although a few may have to leave at 4:30 for a bus.

We will have a "meet and greet" with the college students in early September, and probably a more detailed planning meeting near the end of August of early in September.

Wednesday, September 12; Monday, September 17; and Thursday, September 27. Sessions will be from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. all three days. On the first date

we will be a part of the Volunteer Fair, held on Dunlap Plaza. On the other two dates we will be in Stockdale Center in front of the main dining room. We have the first dates pretty well covered, though we'll be happy to have extra volunteers. We especially need registrars for Thursday, September 27th, as several of our regulars will be out of town.

In addition, if you are an experienced registrar but want a refresher, Tina Conrad will be happy to review the process with you, individually, or in a group if we find a time to appear together. Please call Tina, 734-4612, or let me know.

We also hope to participate in some voter education events during September and/or October. If you have some good ideas as to how to do this, please let me know. Voter Education would be step two.

The third step will be to get people to the polls on Tuesday, November 6. Any ideas on the best way to accomplish this? This year it is particularly crucial that we get people to vote!

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Farewell to Janna Deitz

We say "farewell" and extend best wishes to our branch member and WIU professor, Dr. Janna Deitz, who accepted a new position in Washington D.C. with the American Political Science Association, starting July 30, Janna assumed responsibilities as Senior Director for Professional Development, Public Engagement, and the Congressional Fellowship Program.

Janna has been cited for her many contributions to Western Illinois University and to the Macomb community during her sixteen years of service. She was described as a "deeply engaged" scholar whose interests included American government and politics, legislative policies, campaign finance, and women in politics. Over the years she presented four programs for our branch, including, in 2014, "Enabling Women's Participation: 'Ready to Run in Illinois.' "This successful

seminar for women preparing to run for office, directed by Janna, will now be led by Debbie Kepple-Mamros and Audrey Adamson, administrative assistants at the WIU-Quad Cities campus who have worked with Janna in conducting previous seminars.

Janna is familiar with Washington, D.C., having spent the year 2011-2012 as the recipient of the prestigious American Political Science Association Fellowship and assigned as a Congressional Fellow in the office of Senator Dick Durbin. Now, seven years later, she will direct this fellowship program.

In departing, Janna said, "I have been inspired by the wise, witty, and fierce women I've been so fortunate to connect with. I will miss you all so very much, but I will carry your energy with me." We thank Janna for the energy and inspiration she gave us and wish her well as she journeys forward.

More than 50 people attended a party to bid Janna farewell this week. Tom Carper, who is on the national Amtrak board, was one of the speakers. He reported that Sen. Durbin had told him that Janna was one of the most outstanding fellows to serve in his office, and that they both were delighted that she has this new position. Janna told me earlier that she has received congratulatory notes from several university presidents and presidents of foundations too.
