Thanks to the generosity of our members, we received recognition at the Illinois spring convention as a Top Ten Branch in per capita giving to AAUW in the state of Illinois. Our national dues cover a very small part of AAUW's operating budget and outreach, and individual contributions are needed to fulfill our mission of promoting equity for women and girls. Our per capita giving is based on our collective branch contribution and all of the individual donations we made to AAUW last year.

AAUW Funds is a collection of many specific funds, and donations can be made to any of them at any time. However, members are highly encouraged to consider the Greatest Needs Fund when making individual contributions because donations made to one of the many specific funds and fellowships cannot be used for any other purpose. For a review of all the ways our fundraising supports women, check out the variety of funds at aauw.org. AAUW continues to be on the forefront of supporting graduate education for women through its fellowships. Community action grants fund branch projects throughout the country. The Legal Advocacy Fun provides case support in cases of gender discrimination. The needs are great, and every dollar contributed is put to good use.

The Monmouth Area Branch collectively raises funds through sales of Rada products and our annual holiday brunch. Contributions given directly to the branch are not tax deductible.

Individual contributions made directly to AAUW through one of the national solicitation campaigns or online at aauw.org are tax deductible. The Action Fund is a separate entity involved in voter education, registration, and lobbying. Because it is used for political purposes, it is not part of the AAUW Funds

Our branch book group will begin the 2019-2020 year on Thursday, September 12 at 1:00 p.m. at Vicki Gladfelter's home. We will discuss <u>Can You Ever Forgive Me?</u>: <u>Memoirs of a Literary Forger</u> by Lee Israel. The author had been a successful writer who fell on hard times and embarked on a new career, forging more than 300 letters ostensibly from famous personalities such as Dorothy Parker and Noel Coward, which she sold to collectors and autograph dealers in America. Israel, who died in 2014, was the author of <u>Estee Lauder</u>: Beyond the Magic; <u>Kilgallen</u>; and <u>Miss Tallulah Bankhead</u> before she began her career in forgery and was investigated by the FBI. The book was made into a movie. Our discussion will be a lively one!
