First, a big thank you to Donna Sproston for coordinating our winter voter registration session with Maggie Bruckner and the Associated Students of Monmouth College. Thanks, too, to Mary Osborn and Carol Scotten for stepping up to help! According to Donna, the cooperating teams registered 26 new voters, an excellent record, considering that the table was set up in the lower level of Stockton and not the prime location in front of the cafeteria. The volunteers were also able to answer a lot of questions regarding online registration, changing registration after graduating from college, and voting by mail. Second, another big thank you to Rebecca Eaton for posting a great article on the next step to getting ERA over the next hurdle: removing the irrelevant deadline. There is precedent for passing a constitutional amendment as long as 200 years after it was introduced. There are likely to be challenges in the court, so this story is not over yet, unfortunately. However, we are closer than we have ever been!

Third, now is a good time to think about implications of the gender gap in data collection. According to an article by Caroline Criado Perez in the February 3 issue of <u>Time</u>, the fact that women are not included in statistical studies affects our health and safety. For example, did you know that cars are 71% less safe for women because the crash dummies are based on a 50th percentile-weight man? Or that voice-recognition software is geared to a male voice, creating a 70% less accurate recognition of a message from a woman than from a man? How about this one: medication is usually clinically tested on men, and therefore may not work on a woman who is having her period? The article contains many more examples of the way in which data collection not only discriminates against women, it often leads to products or processes which endanger women! With the increasing use of Artificial Intelligence, it is critically important that the data inputted into the algorithms be accurate and reflects more than just the "standard" male.
