AAUW Town Hall on Zoom

This week I participated in the AAUW Town Hall on Zoom. You can access a recording of the presentation on the AAUW website here:

First, Julie Brown, chair of the AAUW national board, addressed the possibility of an increase in our dues. The board of directors will be meeting in October to discuss how much to recommend to the membership and whether or not to phase in an increase or to increase dues all at once if an increase is approved. The board is considering an increase of between \$3.00 and \$10.00 annually. Currently our national dues are \$59.00; they have been at that level for many years. Once the board sets the amount and the timeline, all AAUW members will have an opportunity to vote to approve or reject the increase next spring. As you may remember, the organization has gone to "one member, one vote" instead of the old way of having such changes voted on

at biennial Association Conventions. This is much fairer, since a very small percentage of the national membership is able to attend a convention. You may be interested in knowing that dues cover only about 15-20% of the annual budget. Other funds come from corporations and foundations. In these crazy times, competition for such funding is even more competitive than usual.

Ms. Brown explained that dues only partially cover the costs of doing the business of AAUW. Our dues cover salaries of staff (which has been reduced from 107 plus interns three years ago to a current 46 Full Time Equivalents currently). Obviously, the staff are dedicated individuals who work extra hard to keep our organization working smoothly. Over four million dollars funded AAUW's various scholarships and grants in 2019. These programs continue because of generous support from branches and members all over the United States.
