I will be moderating the Zoom portion of the evening since Michelle is unable to attend and will be using my Zoom account instead. The change of address is for this program only!




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Public Policy

It's hard to believe that October 2021, marks the 50th anniversary of the passage of the ERA in the U.S House of Representatives. Last Tuesday, Representative Carolyn Maloney convened the House Oversight and Reform Committee to try to find a way to complete the final steps to certification of the ERA. The amendment has met all the criteria for adoption and addition to the United States Constitution as the 28th Amendment. It was ratified by 2/3 of both houses of Congress, and it was finally ratified by 38 states, the ¾ required to become an amendment. Illinois and Virginia were numbers 37 and 38.

It is now up to the National Archivist to certify and to publish the ERA in order for it to become the 28th Amendment. Most scholars say that the arbitrary deadline for passage that some have raised as an obstacle applies only to the preamble and not to the document itself, so the argument that the amendment has "expired" and requires advocates to go back to the beginning is probably just a stalling technique. Both of our Senators, Duckworth and Durbin, and our Representative, Cheri Bustos, favor adding the amendment to the Constitution. Remember, it was first proposed by Alice Paul and the National Women's Political Party in 1923.

The legacy of a decade-old murder plunges Grace Kimball and her town of Endurance into poisons, poppets, and an unforgiving past. A bit of witchcraft, a lot of laughs.



September and October Program Recaps

After a long, long year of Zooming and social distancing, September and October 2021 programs finally brought many of us back together in person with two engaging presentations held on the Monmouth College campus. In September, members of the Monmouth College faculty presented work completed in collaboration with student groups focused on the local community, while October's program brought together two local librarians to discuss Banned Books Week.

Due to a change of programming plans in September after Monmouth's Hispanic Heritage Festival was postponed, our AAUW branch welcomed Monmouth College professors Janis Mars Wunderlich and Dr. Jialin Li, along with their student SOFIA groups, to present their recent work. Summer Opportunities for Intellectual Activities (SOFIA) projects give incoming students an opportunity to work with professors and returning student mentors on research projects for three weeks before the fall semester begins in August. Professor Wunderlich, Dr. Li, and their students shared the results of their summer projects, which highlighted local diversity and examined some of the potential challenges faced by local social groups during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Assistant Professor of Art Wunderlich and her students worked together to plan and execute several murals across the Monmouth College campus and in the community, including an ongoing project to encapsulate the diversity of the Monmouth population in a multimedia mural on the side of the new United Way office. The SOFIA group developed a concept for the large-scale work based on a patchwork quilt, containing images and pieces of fabric representing the different cultures that live side-by-side in Monmouth. Though the project remains in progress, the first square, representing Hispanic culture, is finished and on display on the east side of the building in Monmouth's public square.

Dr. Li, Assistant Professor of Sociology and Anthropology, led her SOFIA group in a project titled A Social Autopsy of COVID-19 in Rural Monmouth, investigating the hypothesis that the ongoing pandemic has imposed additional strain on vulnerable groups living in rural areas by increasing social isolation and economic burden. The students interviewed representatives of the African, Spanish-speaking, and Burmese immigrant populations in Monmouth, as well as elderly members of the community, to develop pictures of each subject's history and pre-COVID social life and explore the impact of the pandemic. Despite limitations on time and data, the group discovered that - thanks to technology and strong familial, religious, and community ties - the people of our community remained socially connected and cared for despite the

physical isolation and financial difficulties inflicted by COVID.

The end of September saw a return of Banned Books Week, an annual event created by the American Library Association in 1982 to celebrate the freedom to read and to highlight books that have been censored by schools and libraries across the nation. October's AAUW program brought together our own co-president Sarah Henderson, director of Monmouth College's Hewes Library, and Larisa Good, director of the Warren County Public Library, to present an overview of Banned Books Week. They introduced their audience to America's most commonly banned books and educated a mixed group of in-person and Zoom attendees about the history of challenged books and other media in America, the ways libraries and educational institutions have worked to counteract these challenges, and what censorship looked like in 2020. Differing backgrounds in academic versus public library spaces allowed Henderson and Good to compare and contrast censorship disputes in each venue, as well as share their predictions for the future of banned media.
