Hi, everybody! I have been thinking about the Fall election. There is no doubt that this will be a very important election, and I wonder if there is something we can do to help get out the vote.

I know Fall is far away, and we have no idea what the Covid 19 virus is going to do. Will it subside, so that we can participate in a voter registration drive on campus, as we have done for many years? My crystal ball does not give me a definitive answer to that question. It will be a few months before we can make that decision, I am afraid. Can we figure out a way to cooperate with a campus group to promote online registration? Maybe? I am rather out of touch, but here are some ideas.

Michelle and Sarah can give us the names of campus leaders to contact this Spring to "plant some seeds,"

with a general plan of what we MIGHT be able to do. I know we have cooperated with a group before, but I cannot remember its name. It was the student activities group. I imagine they have already elected their officers to serve next year. I imagine they will be thinking about voter registration as one of their priorities for the Fall. If one of us steps up to be the contact person, a few emails over the summer break could build a plan. And we might be able to schedule a table at the Activities Fair on Dunlap Plaza, as we have done before, and feel safe enough for an in-person outdoor event. Michelle can give us the names of contact people to participate in that, too.

The election will take place on November 8, which means that in-person registration needs to be completed by 28 days ahead of that date, or October 11, by my calculation. Of course, people can register at the Courthouse up to and including Election Day.

Or do we just want to participate in a campaign to get students to register online? It is a very easy process. Maybe this would merely involve working with the student leaders and get our AAUW name on the promotional materials via the student email list.

I am willing to do whatever I can to help from my new location. Just let me know!
