April 2025 President's Letter – Take a Pause

Dear Friends.

As spring buds are bursting into flower and the weather forecasters are predicting the tug of war between late winter and summer temperatures and storms, we each are noticing our internal temperatures as we are bombarded by 24/7 newscasts on television and in our social media feeds.

I have learned over the years following January 1995 when I first became acquainted with the labyrinth at my seminary, that the labyrinth is a sheltering place within which one can release pressures, pay attention to each step and breath taken, and receive the gift/s it holds.<sup>1</sup>

When I was called to serve the Presbyterian and United Methodist Churches in Oneida IL, it was suggested that the large grassy area south of the Presbyterian Church would be the perfect place to create a grass labyrinth measuring 86 feet in diameter and so it was dedicated on Mother's Day 2000. On 9-1-1 when the NY Trade Towers were struck, I found myself out on the labyrinth, walking those familiar paths to release the fear and pent-up pressures resulting from a world that was crashing into pieces.

Last Sunday I was drawn to the Monmouth College Labyrinth to release much and spend solitary time noticing and giving thanks for each tiny thing I interacted with. Each gust of air. Each bird note sung. Each tiny bug or spider. Spring leaves and buds unfurling. These past several days I have returned to humming or whistling or softly singing

the words to familiar Taizé chants such as \$\mathbb{I}\Stay\$ with me; remain here with me; watch and pray; watch and pray. Or \$\mathbb{I}\Within our darkest night, you kindle the fire that never dies away, never dies away. Within our darkest night, you kindle the fire that never dies away, never dies away.

As I spend greater amounts of time thinking and praying about the many whose lives, studies, and livelihoods are being crushed and torn apart, I am reminded that I must carry the light. I must beam out Light and Love wherever I go. Light and love each hold great healing power. And I must reach out to my legislators to speak up and defend what is right and just. I invite you to share in these lifegiving endeavors to take the pause that refreshes. A giggle may turn into a belly laugh as we create puns and new words.

I also activate the schema of creative thinking by reading or listening to poetry; considering ideas penned by Margaret Wheatley. Living, praying, marching in community-each brings hope. May you experience the spring moon in the early morning hours. Creating collages, journaling. Even catching phrases concretizes the free-floating fear we may be feeling. Whether it's a labyrinth or a country road or a walk/bike around the neighborhood, may you know that all creation is ONE.


